The site was continuously occupied by paleo-humans for tens of thousands of years, served as a shelter for a variety of animal species during extensive periods and is now home to nearly 30,000 bats

9. KRUSHUNA WATERFALLS

Krushuna waterfalls are the largest water travertine cascade in Bulgaria and is 18 km. far from Vila Nina.

They are several, the highest one is 15 meters tall. The falls are located in the Maarata area, on the northern slope of the Devetaki Plateau, near the village of Krushuna, hence the name.

The area of the village of Krushuna is known for one of the shortest eco-trails in Bulgaria and one of the longest caves – the Boninska cave.

Those Bulgarian waterfalls “work” all over the year – there are enough water to feed them . What is more, the walk around the waterfalls always brings freshness and pleasant experience.
